Reminder Please do not send your child to school in sandals or crocs. They are not safe for playground play and sand gets in them which is very uncomfortable for your child.

A Few Fine Motor Milestones to Look For:

2 year old year: Your child can probably string four large beads, snip with scissors, hold a crayon with thumb and finger (not fist), use one hand consistently in most activities, imitate circular and horizontal strokes, unwrap things, paint with some wrist action, and turn pages in a book. 3 year old year: Your child can probably build a tower of nine small blocks, drive nails and pegs, copy circles and cross lines, imitate a T shape, manipulate clay with tools, and cut with scissors. 4 year old year: Your child can probably hold a pencil in hand instead of fist, cut on a line with scissors, unbutton buttons, place peas in a pea board, unscrew a jar lid, string many small beads, turn pages one at a time, and print some capital letters.

5-6 years (Pre-K) A kindergarten ready child cuts out simple shapes, can copy a triangle/square, trace a diamond, writes first name, prints numerals 1-5, has an adult grasp of pencils, ties and zips, completes lacing cards, and attempts to stay in lines when coloring.

While all children develop on an individual time scale, milestones are particularly helpful when assessing kindergarten readiness!
